### The Handbook



In terms of teaching and Digital Humanities, many questions need to be addressed. Should the project examine how to involve digital tools in the humanities? Or should it focus on integrating digital approaches in humanities courses?

For those involved in teaching with technology, the Covid-19 crisis provides an opportunity to radically rethink university education, how universities support learning to provide a quality student experience.

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# How we are coping with the Covid-19 emergency in Academia's

## Some experiences from the partners

With the ongoing Covid19 we are faced with a new teaching and learning reality in all levels of education, including the higher education. One of the biggest changes is adapting to the fully online learning mode while trying to maintain the quality of higher education and support students in the somewhat unexpected learning situation.

The change brought about rapid technical and digital developments in academic fields that previously perhaps lacked the systematic approaches to support students' digital competence development and innovative technology enhanced teaching practices.

During the initial shift to online learning the consortium members quickly realized that comprehensive learning approaches were generalized into using online exams which in most cases are not the ideal approach to assess the students understanding of new knowledge. Higher education institutes moved entirely to online and the entire academic system functioned mainly via videoconferencing technologies. Institutions were required to establish their own policies autonomously within the countermeasures to Covid19 taken in the national level. This brought about major modifications in schedules and regulations which again forced to look into the uneven level of digital competences among the academic staff. Additionally, the creation and sharing of digital learning resources to foster the transition into online teaching was left to a single educator with a lack of centralized approach and support.

Based on this, it is clear that the Hum@n project serves as a starting point for a more comprehensive implementation of technologies in the field of humanities focusing on fostering the systematic digital competence development of higher educators and consequently the quality of higher education. It is evident that a shift in higher education is underway, including both the educational processes and technical infrastructure.

## Insight from our activity

After the publication of the HANDBOOK, which represents the Intellectual Output 1, since December 2020 we were working on IO 2 “COCREATION of the HUM@N training strategy” and IO3 “HUM@N knowledge sharing platform”.

As for the IO 2 partners agreed upon objectives, contents and tools to be used. The sharing platform structure has been under definition.

Meanwhile the Quality management Plan has been finalized and the first monitoring and evaluation data collection has been done.

Due to the Covid -19 the International meetings expected in the period have been postponed while the training would be probably moved online.

The project has an official new ending date which is **31<sup>st</sup> March 2022**.
